This is a list of possibly helpful companies and shops and services for us during this scary period.

Meat. Bridgewater Butchers 22 Bridgewater Road, Washington, NE37 2SG phone number 4167774. Email sales@bridgewaterbutchers.co.uk this company has a website to order from they do deliver sometimes the next day. I have been told the meat is good.

Fruit and Veg. Thoburns telephone number 4154811 they are in Concord. They do take telephone orders and deliver usually the next day. We have used them and the produce was good and fresh.

J R Holland, 4190856, 245 Dukesway, Team Valley, NE11 OPZ this company is a wholesaler who is selling boxes of salad veg. boxes of vegetables, boxes of dairy produce and pensioner boxes. We have had both a salad and veg box and both were excellent. They do have a taxi delivery service depending on the area you live in. If you or relatives want to do a pick up there is a no contact system in operation.

Groceries Nisa Store Barmston Village. Phone number 4177197 this is Bob Singh he is a local shop but he has extensive stocks. He also has a setup of local volunteers who will deliver to elderly people who are staying in the house. For those of you who have a Facebook account he is on "What's on in Washington". He seems to be doing lot for the community in this time of trouble.

Iceland online delivery service if you can get a slot you can get next day delivery, we've used it twice and got most of what we ordered.

ASDA on line. It's almost impossible to get a delivery but we used the Click and Collect at Boldon. I went there to the Click and Collect point in the undercover car park at my appointed pick up time. The young man asked for my name and I parked in one of the bays he brought out the order in bags in trays and left me to load up and leave, a good system.

Morrison's on line. It is difficult to get a delivery slot we got one two weeks ago for this week, they deliver to-morrow. The next delivery slot we have is 27th so we will be fine until then.

Sainsbury on line is also difficult if not impossible to get a delivery slot.

Tesco on line we have not tried.






